Bria Toiyon Chism lost her battle with cancer at the age of six in 1999. She needed a marrow transplant to survive, but there just wasn't a large enough pool of African-Americans on the registry to draw from. Her grandparents, Walter and



LaGail Chism, researched the topic of marrow transplants in African-American patients. They discovered that minorities in the U.S. in general, are not well represented on the marrow registry, and that this was primarily due to a lack of awareness that marrow transplants can save lives.
